What are First Nations-led IPCAs?

First Nations-led IPCAs are First Nations-led, community-driven initiatives that protect our lands and waters for future generations

They are grounded in First Nations law, culture, language, governance, and Knowledge, reflecting our deep and enduring connections to all our relations

They carry forward holistic First Nations practices maintained over millennia and affirm First Nations Inherent Rights and responsibilities

They share three essential elements:

- 1 Led by First Nations
- 2 Protect lands and waters for future generations
- 3 Elevate First Nations Rights and Responsibilities ¹

What IPCAs are not

IPCAs are **not** led or determined by Canadian governments.

IPCAs do **not** automatically prohibit fishing.

Did you know?

There are over 200 First Nations Guardian programs across Turtle Island. Guardians are trained experts who help care for the lands and waters. ²

Guardian programs created ~1,500 jobs, building strong economies and communities. ²

Marine IPCAs can help protect First Nations' fishing rights.
