Our lands and waters have always sustained our Nations—not only as sources of economic opportunity but as the foundation of our cultures, languages, and ways of life. First Nations must lead the conversations on resource development, ensuring that our inherent and Treaty rights are upheld and that our voices guide policies, partnerships, and sustainable practices.

This forum is an opportunity to share knowledge, strengthen partnerships, and advance First Nations sovereignty over our natural resources. We will explore ways to enhance First Nations participation in key sectors, including

energy and forestry, while reinforcing our role in decision-making, benefit-sharing, and environmental stewardship.

As we gather on the unceded and ancestral territories of the xwməθkwəy'əm (Musqueam), Skwxwú7mesh (Squamish), and səlilwətał (Tsleil-Waututh) Nations, we recognize the deep responsibilities we hold as caretakers of these lands. Guided by the wisdom of our ancestors and the vision of future generations, we must continue working together to assert our rights and build a future where First Nations are not just participants but decision-makers and rights-holders in all matters affecting our lands, waters and resources.

Thank you for being part of this important dialogue. We look forward to hosting you, learning from each of you, and working together to shape the path forward.




