Making Connections

Driving cross-country twice this summer was a great reminder of connections – yours and mine, to the land, and to each other. I was so humbled to meet our grassroots people along my path and to hold in my heart your triumphs as well as your grief. This was never more poignant than in Red Earth, Saskatchewan at the wake of little Frank Young. We are all deeply connected through our grief for Frank, his family, and communities.

COVID-19

I tested positive for COVID-19 for the very first time while visiting Newfoundland at the end of August. My symptoms were mild which I attribute to being fully vaccinated – as well as the love and care shown to me by the Mi'kmaq families throughout my self-isolation period. As we anticipate and navigate the unknown seasonal patterns of coronavirus, I'm encouraging First Nations to exercise caution, get boosted once eligible, and continue to keep our most vulnerable in our hearts and our minds.



Papal Visit

I made a promise that I would participate in welcoming Pope Francis when he arrived on Turtle Island and on July 24 in Edmonton and July 25 in Maskwacis, I kept my promise—not for the Pope but for Survivors and Intergenerational Trauma Survivors. As I said at the time, reactions to the papal visit and the words "I am deeply sorry" are all individual, powerful, and valid. As National Chief, I remain cautious and critical of the Church while also committed to the Healing Path Forward. Meegwetch Ermineskin First Nation for hosting the apology event and NWT Regional Chief Gerald Antoine as AFN lead on the papal visit.

Lifelong Learning

My leadership journey began with protests of First Nations post-secondary funding cuts/caps in 1989 and this summer, I was proud to join many educators, advocates, and Youth at AFN's National Education Forum, working toward a positive vision and healing in education. While in Alberta, Dr. Marilyn Buffalo offered me a tour of Nechi, the center of Indigenous learning AFN pledged to support by way of Special Resolution in 2019. I was also humbled to attend the annual Indspire gala, broadcast in June, and accept a humanitarian award from the Weengushk Film Institute in July.

Fisheries

Early this summer, we established separate East Coast / West Coast Fisheries portfolios and I was honoured for invitations to attend a We'koma'q steelhead trout fish farm and First Fish Ceremony in Spuzzum, on each coast, respectively. Fishing is medicine, it's sacred, and essential to our culture, traditions, and peoples. I support its protection today and for future generations.

The theme of AFN's 43rd AGA was Walking the Healing Path and what we heard from Chiefs both on the assembly floor and in the Resolutions they passed is that the healing path includes Truth, Transparency, and Accountability. While many view the AGA as a "victory" for those concepts, I see it as a strong mandate to continue the work of transformative change, always with a deep and abiding love and care for all people. The authority of the FNIA (Chiefs) to drive the agenda of the AFN was affirmed which will result in the positive evolution of the organization. As I said in my speech, I am a warrior of peace and will spend the months and years ahead ensuring peace and harmony is restored to all relationships.
